Let's hope the girls are keeping their internal temperatures in the mid nineties and they have plenty of reserve honey stores to maintain their energy. On the (very) random sunny 45-50+ degree days - you should observe them doing cleansing flights, getting out and relieving themselves and stretching their wings! It's always interesting when there is snow covering the ground, you'll notice yellow spots around the colonies, suppose that is bee-pee. Clever friends always remind me of the same old grandpa joke, "where do bees go to the bathroom?"

Things to do in February...

- Use a small stick and clear the entrance of any dead bees plugging the way out. This will also allow much-needed airflow through the hive.
- Start building frames and extra boxes to supplement your dreams next year. Be prepared for the rapid brood increase and have an extra Nuc or two available.
- Read and learn about queen rearing, swarming, and crafts with wax.
- Purchase a pollen trap, propolis catcher, drone frame, etc...
- Start planning your flower garden with pollinator-friendly seedlings (Tithonia – my favorite)!

Recipe of the Month **Baked Honey Chicken Tenders**

Golden baked chicken tenders using honey and breadcrumbs for a crispy coating. From Charlotte Anderson at Carolina Honeybees.

> Prep Time: 15 mins Cook Time: 16 mins Total Time: 31 mins Yield: 3 servings

Ingredients

1 pound chicken tenders 2 tablespoons mayo 1 tablespoon honey

1/2 cup Italian breadcrumbs (or Panko) (optional)

1/2 cup Parmesan cheese

Directions

Preheat oven to 425 degrees Mix mayo and honey and toss tenders until coated Toss coated tenders in breadcrumbs Place on foil lined baking sheet and sprinkle with parmesan

Bake for 8 minutes, then turn and bake another 8 minutes Enjoy!
